Thrice-yearly update to all members of the Diocese of Athabasca.

Dear People of Christ:

Greetings! In the name of our Lord and Saviour, the Risen Christ, may you be greatly blessed in your ministry with Him. Being in the world, our ministry is put forth by everything that we say and do, including our financial actions, so I will start my update by looking at that. Below is our draft financial statement from the end of 2021. Once the final year-end statement has been approved by DEC, the statements will be available to everyone who is interesting in reading them.

As you can see, our Parish contributions were around \$25,000 higher than forecast – thank you to all of you who contributed more than we anticipated! Also, our support of parishes was less than forecast – again, thank you! That was possible because you were directly supporting your parishes in their obligations. We were able to directly assist parishes in need on many fronts, and all that assistance was made possible because of your contributions. You'll also notice that Salaries and Benefits are lower, mainly due to reduced travel allowance costs with the Archdeacon and myself. Office Operations and Travel itself were also reduced. We did not have a Diocesan Synod, and we did not spend our Indigenous Ministry funding due to a variety of circumstances.

This almost illustrates "what is the minimum cost to run a diocese." We are anticipating further cost reductions in 2022 upon the retirement of our Archdeacon in July, and realignment of our Administrative Assistant position (more on that below). The Archdeacon has been an invaluable asset to me and has spent much time training our Administrative Assistant and working with our Treasurer so we will be able to function after his retirement. As part of that, we are planning to transfer our book-keeping from in-house to the Diocese of Calgary, who have graciously agreed to take this on for us.



As you can see, we have a rise in assets of almost \$75,000. However, due to our extraordinary financial circumstances you need to be aware that we did not send our annual gift to the National Church of \$50,000 for the past two years – this has been reinstated into our budget for this year and we are intending to send it in full.

The end result of this is that, during the past two years of covid, we have successfully transitioned out of a deficit position by cutting as many costs as we could and still function. I think we are now at almost the leanest we can be – and I would like to change the focus from cutting costs and "ensuring survival", to investing in the stability, growth, and flourishing of our congregations and parishes. Thank you very much for your dedicated stewardship and support in the past two years, and I look forward to following the steps of Christ going forward, as He further establishes His family here in northern Alberta!



As I mentioned, we have realigned our Administrative Assistant position. Our previous Assistant, Kelinda MacRoberts, left our office for a position with the Town of Peace River – she left with our blessing, and with our thanks for the work she had done for us. She did not have it easy, coming on at the same time as a new bishop and both of us trying to figure out which way was up.


Looking at ministry costs, we changed the Administrative position from a full-time salary to one which paid \$20 per hour for 15 hours per week, with no benefits other than the required EI and CPP. We then advertised the position, with the Archdeacon, the Dean, and the Treasurer responsible for interviewing and choosing the successful applicant. At the end of the process (which I must stress I had no part of, and for which there were several applicants), they offered the position to my wife, Benita Greenwood, and she accepted.

As she is my wife, this details strict enforcement for:

- while she prepares the cheques, she has no signing authority and cannot dispense funds on her own volition (whereas Kelinda was one of the signing authorities for the diocese);
- while she gathers and catalogues the office mail, she does not open anything specifically addressed to me as Bishop;
- I keep all confidential matters to myself and the parties directly involved.

I pray that you will welcome our new Administrative Assistant and support her – I can vouch that she is friendly, helpful, and wants you all to succeed in your ministries in Christ.

As I mentioned above, our Very Reverend Canon Terry Leer is retiring this coming July. Also, Bishop Larry Robertson is (re)retiring at the same time. Finally, the Reverend Fariborz Khandani of Christ Church Grande Prairie has accepted a position with the Anglican Church in Cochrane, Diocese of Calgary. This is a lot of change to digest in a short period of time! Please join me in prayerfully thanking each of them for their ministry amongst us, and how each has, in their way, represented the Image of God to us – and also pray for their new journeys to be of great blessing for them and for those they meet, in Christ.



As part of investing in the people of our diocese, we are hoping to have a Youth Canoe Trip this summer, for youth from across the diocese, being organized by Mr. Willi Whiston, Youth Leader for our Fort McMurray parishes. If you know of someone from grades 7-12 who would benefit from a paddle with Christ in a secluded wilderness setting, please contact the Diocesan Synod Office.

Also, I want to again recommend to all of you our webinar series being led by the Rev. Judy Paulsen of Wycliffe College, University of Toronto. She will gently lead us out of our comfort zones as we seek to move with Christ in the paths He is leading us on, to call all people to Himself. Our next webinar is planned for mid-May, so please be on the lookout for more information. All are welcome and invited!

In closing, I see that +Stephen, Bishop of Edmonton, has an informal "Ask your Bishop" zoom meeting planned in which he can give updates and answer any questions people may have. If you would find such an event helpful, please let the Synod Office know and I would be pleased to have it with you, as a one-time or recurring event.

Finally, I end with this from Paul's letter to the Colossians:

As Your chosen ones, Oh Lord, clothe us with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience. Guide us to bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other; just as You have forgiven us, so we also must forgive. Above all, clothe us with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. Let Your peace rule in our hearts. May we indeed be one body, full of thankfulness. May Your word, Oh Christ, dwell in us richly; may we teach and admonish one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in our hearts sing to You. May we do everything in Your name, Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God our Father through You. Amen.
